Plant-Based Eating

Our plant-based eating program focuses on promoting healthy and sustainable food choices, supporting equitable access to healthy food, and spreading awareness about the positive health and environmental impacts of a plant-based diet.

Slow Cooker Peanut Tofu and Broccoli

We are right in the middle of cozy season. Here is a plant based slow cooker recipe to warm you up, care of <u>Six Vegan Sisters</u>. Pair with a grain like quinoa or rice for a hearty lunch or dinner.

Ingredients

- 1 (14 oz) block extra firm tofu, drained and pressed
- 1 tsp olive oil optional, for sautéing
- 1 head (about 5 cups chopped) broccoli
- 1/2 cup coconut milk, full fat preferred
- 1/4 cup peanut butter
- 3 Tbsp soy sauce
- 1 tsp chili garlic sauce
- 1 Tbsp rice vinegar
- 1 tsp agave or maple syrup
- 1 tsp cornstarch



3 Tbsp water

- green onion for topping
- sesame seeds for topping

Instructions

- 1. Chop tofu into roughly 1-inch pieces. Optional for crispier tofu: If preferred, sauté the tofu in 1 tsp olive oil over medium-high heat until lightly crispy on all sides.
- 2. Chop broccoli into bite-sized pieces and set aside.
- 3. Add to your slow cooker coconut milk, peanut butter, soy sauce, chili garlic sauce, rice vinegar, and agave (or maple syrup).
- 4. Whisk all ingredients together and add the cubed tofu.
- 5. Cover and cook on low. Set timer for 2 hours (Note: you will have to add the broccoli and cornstarch slurry after 1 hour 15 minutes, and open to stir 20 minutes after that)
- 6. In a small bowl, combine the cornstarch and water and whisk well. With 45-minutes left on the timer, add the cornstarch slurry and chopped broccoli. Mix well, scraping peanut butter sauce off sides if stuck.
- 7. With 25-minutes remaining, open and stir one last time.
- 8. Serve over rice, quinoa, or your favorite grain. Top with green onions, sesame seeds, and more chili garlic sauce, if preferred.

Recycling and Zero Waste

Egg Cartons: Dirty Dozen Item of the Quarter



The "<u>Dirty Dozen</u>" are 12 items that can mislead anyone trying to recycle right. These items seem recyclable, but actually contaminate the recycling process. Please keep them out of your recycling cart.

One item on the Dirty Dozen list is egg cartons. Whether made of clear or foam plastic or molded paper, egg cartons cannot be recycled in our program. There is no recycling market demand for the types of plastic or foam used for egg

cartons, and the paper fibers cannot be remade into new paper products.

Please place foam or plastic cartons in the trash. You can put molded paper egg cartons in the compost/food scraps cart, or compost them in a backyard bin. Learn more about the

Free Compost and Mulch

Did you know the food scraps, food-soiled paper, and plants that you throw in your green compost cart are made into a finished compost product, full of beneficial nutrients to grow new plants? Mountain View and Sunnyvale residents can pick up free compost as well as tan mini-mulch (up to 96 gallons of each) from the <u>SMaRT Station</u> (301 Carl Road, Sunnyvale) 7 days per week.
